# Be weather prepared

As we are all more than aware, our weather is becoming more unsettled across the whole of the year. We're seeing more extreme weather events, which can increase the risk of flooding. This is why it is so important that we are all prepared.

There are lots of things that we can do at home to make sure that we are weather prepared over the months ahead and we have provided some useful tips below.

# Check if you are at risk of long-term flooding

You can check the flood risk for the post code area where you live at: www.gov.uk/check-longterm-flood-risk

## Sign up for flood warnings

In many flood risk areas, you can sign up for flood warnings by visiting: www.gov.uk/sign-up-for-flood-warnings. These warn of the risk of flooding from rivers, the sea and groundwater. You'll be alerted by phone, email, or text when flooding is expected. Please be aware that these alerts are not available in all areas.

#### Know what to do

The best way to protect yourself from flooding is to know what to do in advance.

The Environment Agency issues three levels of flood warning:



#### Flood alert **Prepare**

- prepare a bag that includes medicines and insurance documents.
- · check flood warnings.



#### Flood warning Act

- turn off gas, water and electricity.
- move things upstairs or to safety.
- move family, pets and car to safety.



#### Severe flood warning **Survive**

- call 999 if in immediate danger.
- follow advice from emergency services.
- keep yourself and your family safe.

#### Make a flood plan

Make a personal flood plan for your household or business to help you plan ahead for flooding.

Save a copy of the 'Flood warnings – know what to do' action list which explains steps to take if there's a flood in your area, which you can find at: www.gov.uk/government/publications/personal-flood-plan

You should also prepare a bag of essential items to take with you if you have to leave your home. Keep this in a safe place. You could include things like spare medication; glasses; clothing; important documents; and contact details such as the number of your insurance company.

Create a checklist of things to do to protect your family, such as turning off the electricity and gas to prevent a fire.

# Know how to turn off your gas, electricity and water

If you leave your home during a flood, you'll need to turn off your mains water, gas and electricity if it's safe to do so. You should find out in advance how to do this.

The location of water stopcocks, gas shut-off valves and electrical master switches varies between properties. The gas shut-off valve is usually beside the meter. The mains electricity cut-off is usually a big red switch on your fuse box. If you can't find your water stopcock, ask someone with practical experience or a plumber to help you.

#### **Protect your property**

You can make changes to your property that will help you to get back to normal more quickly after a flood and reduce the damage flooding can do.

To reduce flood damage you can take steps such as laying tiles instead of carpets, moving electrical sockets higher up the wall and fitting non-return valves to stop flood water entering your property through the drains.

Simple maintenance like keeping drains and gullies clear of debris will also help to protect your property.

#### **Check your insurance**

Make sure you have insurance to protect your home or business. If you have buildings and contents insurance, check if flood damage is included.

If you rent your home, it's your responsibility to protect your belongings.

If you're finding it difficult to get your property insured for flooding, the National Flood Forum **www.nationalfloodforum.org.uk** may be able to help.

### **Coastal Partners**

Five local authorities along the south coast, including our own, have joined together to form Coastal Partners.

This is a team of engineers, surveyors, project managers, environment and finance experts who centrally deliver a coastal management service across 246 km of coastline. The partnership carries out many functions that help to protect thousands of homes, businesses, wildlife and infrastructure. Their diverse work includes managing flood and erosion risk, planning and designing new coastal defence schemes, inspecting and maintaining existing defences and working towards a flood resilient future.

In this district, Coastal Partners manage the risk from coastal erosion and flooding on the open coastline between East Head and Pagham Harbour. They ensure that existing flood defence structures are repaired in a timely manner and work with colleagues from other authorities to plan for the short, medium and long-term protection of the coastline. The team also develop and deliver schemes to maintain defences or improve the level of defence in response to climate change.

In the event of a flood warning issued by the Environment Agency, Coastal Partners also provide technical assistance. During the winter it has a number of Coastal Incident Officers in place when the tide is predicted to be particularly high. They work with emergency planning teams to provide suitable assistance for the predicted flooding. You can find out more about Coastal Partners at: www.coastalpartners.org.uk

# **Thinking about** building your own home? Join our custom and self-build housing register

This autumn we have launched a campaign encouraging people who are interested in building their own homes to join our self-build register.

Self-build can be a more affordable way to own your own home and live in an individual home that meets your specific needs. Whether you want to manage the construction of your home from beginning to end; to projects where you commission your own home and make key design and layout decisions, there are a wide variety of self-build and custom housebuilding options for you.

All local authorities keep a register of any individual or local community groups who want to obtain land to build their own homes and they must take this demand into account when preparing local plans.

We want to create more opportunities for self-build and custom build for everyone in the Chichester Local Plan area and this is why our register is so important – it enables us to find out where people would like their plot to be and the type of house that they would like to build.

The register is free to join and is open to everyone.

#### What's the difference between custom and self-build housing?

The two terms are different and relate to the amount of involvement that you have with the build and the level of project management that you undertake.

Self-build is where someone directly organises the design and construction of their own home and can include DIY homes; contractor-built homes; kit houses; and community projects.

Custom build is where you employ a specialist developer to build your home. to your specifications. They find the site; prepare it; and help to arrange the finance.

The design may be bespoke or chosen from a range of standard options.

You can also work with a group of other people on a community project, where you work on a small number of properties together.

- Typically, self-build homes are 25% cheaper than buying a new home from a developer.
- New research has found that 1 in 3 people are interested in selfbuilding (National Custom & Self Build Association and the Building Societies Association 2020).
- Currently, 13,000 people a year in the UK manage to build their own homes.
- 7% to 10% of all new homes built in the UK are self-built.
- The total market is worth around £3.5 billion.
- 90% of those who built their own home would recommend self-building
- Choice is the biggest reason why people self-build.
- The average house size for a self-build property is 268m<sup>2</sup>.
- One in two people who built their own home installed a sustainable heat source.
- On average, it costs between £1,000 and £3,000/m<sup>2</sup> to build your own home.



# **Keep safe and well** all year round

We're starting to see the first signs of winter and it's as important as ever to ensure you're not at risk of health issues caused by poor conditions in your home.

Citizens Advice have partnered with us, alongside SGN, UK Power Networks, Southern Water and Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks to share these handy hints and tips to help keep you and your home safe, whatever the weather.



#### Who's most at risk from cold weather?

- people aged 65 and older.
- children under the age of five.
- people on a low income.
- people with long-term health conditions.
- people with disabilities.
- pregnant women.
- people with a mental health condition.

It's important to get medical help if you feel unwell.

#### **Temperature**

During colder periods it's important to know the temperature of the room you're in, so ensure you have a thermometer if you ever feel cold at home. Always aim to keep the room you're in at 18°C or more to avoid heightened risk of high blood pressure and stroke.

#### **Heating controls**

If you're in one room, you don't have to heat the whole house. Use your heating controls or thermostatic radiator valves to warm the spaces you're using and turn those down to a minimum in unused rooms. If you have health conditions such as asthma or COPD, it's important to think about hallways and spaces you may walk through during the day, as sudden changes in temperature may exacerbate your condition.

#### **Reduce your risk of fires**

Ensure chimneys are swept and any wood you use is dry. Check electrical appliances like electric blankets, are safe to use. Your local fire service may be able to help or complete your own home fire safety check online in just 15 minutes: www.safelincs.co.uk/hfsc

#### How to stay safe from the dangers of Carbon Monoxide

- Get coal, oil and natural gas appliances checked annually by a qualified professional.
- Fit an audible carbon monoxide alarm.
- Regularly test your alarm and replace the batteries/alarm as and when required.
- Ensure there is adequate ventilation and don't block air vents.
- Turn off the appliance and seek immediate assistance if you suspect CO or your CO alarm sounds.

If you smell gas:

- · open windows and doors.
- turn off the gas supply at the meter and turn off any gas appliances, except if your meter in a cellar.
- call the National Grid Emergency Number on **0800 111 999**.
- · don't smoke or use any naked flames.
- · don't touch any electrical switches.



# This Christmas and beyond!

From a galaxy far, far away 'May The Toys Be With You' is an absolute must-see exhibition for fans of Star Wars and the silver screen.



One of the UK's finest collections of vintage Star Wars toys and original cinema posters is currently on display in The Novium Museum, Chichester.

'May The Toys Be With You' is a celebration of both the now highly collectable vintage toy line and the iconic design work and art of the original Star Wars movies.

The exhibition features hundreds of incredible vintage toys, posters and memorabilia, including:

- A 1977 movie poster by The Brothers Hildebrant. Given 36 hours to complete the poster, the twins worked collaboratively in a single non-stop session to achieve the print deadline.
- A 1978 Death Star model. Rather than make a large, prohibitively expensive plastic playset, this design used cardboard pieces which slotted together to create the iconic corridors and chambers of the Empire's battle station.
- 1978 Millennium Falcon. Designed by Kenner engineer Mark Boudreaux. A spaceship and playset in one. Children could sit Han Solo and Chewbacca in the cockpit, and the rear lid comes off to reveal a playset environment with gunners chair, training ball, and the iconic chess set.

- The first 12 Star Wars figures from 1978. The term 'action figure' was coined in 1964 to describe the 12" tall Action Man and Barbie figures. Kenner made the Star Wars figures smaller at just 3.75" because they also wanted to create accompanying spaceships and playsets. The success of the Star Wars toy line ensured that 3.75" would become a new industry standard.
- Archival footage of movie trailers and interviews with the toy makers and a soundscape using soundtracks from the Star Wars films, including music performed by the London Symphony Orchestra.

Visitors can also look forward to some interactive gallery features: dress up as a Star Wars character, pose for a selfie with a Storm Trooper, complete trails around the gallery, and an opportunity to explore other toys from the 1970s with a look through a vintage toy box.

'May The Toys Be With You' will run until Saturday 20 April 2024. Tickets cost £4 for adults, £2.50 for children and £12 for a family of up to five (maximum two adults). Quiet sessions are also available, find out more at www.thenovium.org/ quietsessions

# Energy grants for your home

The average household could be wasting hundreds of pounds each year because their property isn't energy efficient. Here's the lowdown on some of the schemes you could access qualify for energy grants from the government or your energy supplier to help make your home more energy efficient, cut your carbon footprint and reduce your bills. We've even created an easy-to-use table for you on page 19 too!

#### **Boiler Upgrade Scheme**

Through the Boiler Upgrade Scheme, you could get a grant to cover part of the cost of replacing fossil fuel heating systems with a heat pump or biomass boiler. Fossil fuel heating systems include oil, gas or electric. Your property must have a valid Energy Performance Certificate with no outstanding recommendations for loft or cavity wall insultation to be eligible. #### **Warmer Homes**

If your home is not heated by mains gas, you may be eligible for a free heat pump, solar panels and insulation through the government's Home Upgrade Grant (HUG). This grant is for low- income households or for those in receipt of means tested benefits and who have a property with an Energy Performance Rating (EPC) of E, F or G. #### **Chichester Warm Homes** initiative

Funding is available for homeowners and landlords with an eligible tenant, to install energy efficient and low carbon measures. The maximum grant available is £10,000 for homeowners living in on-gas areas, and up to £25,000 for those in off-gas areas. Find out more details in our table. #### Free insulation and energy efficiency grants from energy suppliers

The Energy Company Obligation (ECO) scheme offers grants to low-income households and those in vulnerable situations to insulate their homes. You might also be able to get help with replacing an old, inefficient boiler or other heating system through the initiative.

- target projects which will benefit residents most in need.


