Community-led affordable housing is launched in Easebourne for local people

Eight new community-led affordable homes to let in Easebourne, where the average property price is £550,000, are being handed over to local people this month.

The homes, which are for people who live, have been brought up, or who work in the area and cannot afford to buy or rent locally, have been purchased by Midhurst Community Land Trust, with the support of Chichester District Council.

Chichester District Council provided grant funding towards the scheme from its Community Led Housing Fund and Section 106 affordable housing funding. The trust also received grant funding from the South Downs National Park Authority, The Boltini Trust and Friends of Midhurst Community Hospital. The remaining costs are being covered by a commercial loan.

The homes, which the Community Land Trust have bought on a new housing development, will be kept for local people; offer a rent that will be around 70% of the local open market rent; and as long as all goes well, the tenants will have use of the homes for life. The Community Land Trust has also fitted carpets and supplied all of the white goods in the homes, so that they are completely ready for the new tenants to move into.

Two of the homes are being allocated to NHS staff, after local health services have

found it difficult to recruit due to high house prices in the area.

"I really am looking forward to moving in!" says Maxine, one of the new tenants. "I've lived in the area for many, many years and work just down the road at the local primary school – my daughter lives in Midhurst too. I've seen the flat now and it is absolutely amazing. I just can't wait to move in now!"

Another new resident, Frances, adds: "I've grown up and lived locally since I was five years old, and it means everything to me to be able to live here. It's a huge privilege and I'm thrilled to have the opportunity to join this new community. I thank everyone who has made it possible."

"We are incredibly proud of what has been achieved," says Adrian Moore, Chair of Midhurst CLT. "It is so difficult for local people who have grown up in the area or for local keyworkers to afford to stay here, due to high house prices. Schemes such as this one mean that people can stay in the area where they grew up, or work, rather than move away to another area where it may be more affordable to live."

Midhurst Community Land Trust already manages two affordable homes in Midhurst, and another Community Land Trust in the district is in the process of building 12 new affordable homes in Westbourne.

"The Midhurst and Westbourne
Community Land Trusts have
demonstrated what can be achieved
when the local community works with
the council and other partners to deliver
affordable housing. This is why we are
so keen for other communities to come
forward to work with us in other rural
areas," says Councillor Oona Hickson,
Cabinet Member for Housing, Revenues
and Benefits at Chichester District Council.

"Housing is a huge issue for the district. Around 2,000 households with a connection to the district – such as people who have been brought up here or who are a key worker in the district – are waiting for a home in our area. We want those who grow up here to have the option to stay here and important key workers to be able to afford to work here. These are important people who we rely on and want to keep close by.

"This is why schemes such as this are so important in our rural villages. As a council, we don't own housing stock and instead work with local registered housing providers who manage and supply local affordable homes. In rural locations, local housing registered housing providers often find it difficult to take on homes in these locations due to the small number of homes involved. This is why Community Land Trusts are so important, because not only are the affordable homes managed by local people, but they are also protected for the use of local people."

Community Land Trusts are set up and run by local people to develop and manage homes. They also manage other assets important to their local community which could be a local pub or shop that is at risk of closure or providing local workspaces or community facilities. The Community Land Trust acts as the long-term steward of these assets and in the case of housing, ensuring it remains affordable in perpetuity.

Community Land Trusts provide affordable homes in local communities where the cost of housing is high and where it is difficult to bring forward new housing due to the land value being so high. They play an important role in contributing to affordable housing delivery.

Any communities that are interested in setting up their own affordable housing project are encouraged to contact Chichester District Council's Housing Delivery Team for advice. There are many different ways for communities to set up their own housing project. Examples of projects include community-owned rented housing; low-cost housing for sale; housing co-operatives; self-build schemes; co-ownership; and housing for older people. Helping to reduce homelessness in our district

As part of our housing priority to reduce homelessness in the district, we are working on several new projects to help address some of the issues that people have been experiencing in the private rented sector.

One initiative is 'Call Before You Serve' and aims to assist landlords who are considering serving eviction notices to their tenants. Eviction is often a last resort on the landlord's part, and the aim of this initiative is to help resolve any tenancy issues and prevent eviction action needing to be taken.

The idea is to develop better relationships with local landlords in order to help bring on more properties that they may have in their portfolio. A number of councils have had success with this approach. The opportunity to intervene at the earliest stage helps to reduce homelessness and improves security for both tenant and landlord.

These schemes can offer a range of support from creating a personalised housing plan with the tenant to resolving issues that may be impacting on their tenancy, to helping tenants to address financial difficulties that have led to getting into arrears with rent payments through support from housing benefit services, the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP), local government homelessness prevention funds, charities and money advice services.

"Homelessness is an issue across the country, and we have seen a huge rise in the amount of money that the council has been spending on temporary accommodation," says Councillor Oona Hickson, Cabinet Member for Housing, Revenues and Benefits at Chichester District Council. "As a council we are being very proactive in looking for solutions to improve the situation and we know from the research carried out that schemes such as these can have a huge impact on helping private landlords stay in the market, knowing that they have support and advice. Unlike private letting agents we can also help support tenants who are struggling or experiencing issues and ensure that they stay in accommodation."

Supporting You

If you're struggling with issues such as being in rent arrears, or not being able to pay your household bills, then our Supporting You Team is here to help.

Our team of specialist trained advisors work alongside our other council teams. Their role is to help people access a wide range of help including maximising income; debt signposting; employment advice; budgeting support; food provision, help to pay bills, plus signposting clients to our health and wellbeing team.

The team was established in 2022 in response to the cost-of-living crisis, to help those who were struggling. Since launching, they have helped thousands of people across the district with support and advice through their holistic approach.

Councillor Oona Hickson, Cabinet Member for Housing, Revenue and Benefits at Chichester District Council, says: "We've been able to help many people get back on an even keel and feel more in control of their financial situation. The team often look after cases where several different issues are involved, resulting in a complex and often distressing situation for the resident. This could be a housing problem compounded by financial issues, which can then go on to have a huge impact on their general health and wellbeing.

"The team can take an overview of their situation, helping with all the different issues. Their role means that they have more time to really talk with a client and find out about what they are going through. Most people don't know the level of support they are entitled to and it's amazing how a few changes can transform someone's life and their outlook. People often say they feel more empowered and can breathe easier following our support."

Check what you can claim

If you're struggling, then here are our top five tips to ensure that you or a loved one are claiming what you are entitled to:

1. Use our benefits and budgeting calculator

Use our free benefits and budgeting calculator at www.chichester.gov.uk/benefitsandbudgetingcalculator

Fill in the details then generate an estimate of your benefits entitlement.

You can then use this to:

- save and download information about benefits and how to maximise income;
- see which benefits couples can claim to maximise joint income; and
- use it as a handy benefits and budgeting calculator.

If you need further advice and support, you can choose to share your information with one of our Supporting You advisors who can provide further support and tips on how to make savings in your budget.

2. Check whether you can claim Pension Credit

If you're eligible for the State Pension, then also check to see whether you're entitled to Pension Credit which is one of the most under-claimed benefits. Simply visit: www.gov.uk/pension-credit

The scheme can also provide access to a range of other benefits such as help with housing costs - from housing benefit (if you rent the property you live in), to support for mortgage interest (if you own the property you live in).



It can also help you claim help with council tax, heating bills and for those aged 75 or over, a free TV licence.

Those receiving certain benefits may also qualify for the Winter Fuel Payment, which is designed to help you cover your costs over the winter months: www.gov.uk/winter-fuel-payment

3. Check if you can claim Attendance Allowance

Attendance Allowance is for anyone of state pension age and is not means tested. It helps with extra costs if you have a disability or health condition that requires you to need someone to help look after you.

Your council tax explained

You may be surprised to know that if you are a Band D taxpayer, we charge you just £3.69 a week for our services. Although we collect your council tax, we only keep around 8% of the amount you pay each year. Of the 92% remaining, 77% goes to West Sussex County Council, around 11% goes to Sussex Police and Crime Commissioner and roughly 4% goes to parish councils. Each authority makes its own decisions about any changes.

Offering value for money

You come into contact with our work every day. We provide over 80 services to you, across 303 square miles. We empty your bins, check food hygiene standards, licence taxis, clean your streets, care for our parks and open spaces and provide support and reassurance to our communities.

In order to protect vital services for our residents, we have increased the average tax bill by approximately 10 pence a week for a Band D property. This means that the average council tax payer will pay £3.69 a week for the services we provide each day.

Extra support

We know that for people on low incomes, paying council tax on top of the cost of living can be a struggle. Our local council tax reduction scheme supports those on low incomes with up to 100% of the total cost of council tax. We also have a Discretionary Scheme to assist those disadvantaged by the banded scheme for those in receipt of universal credit and care leavers.

Our dedicated Supporting You Team are also available to help you if you are struggling financially. The service is delivered by a dedicated team of trained

advisors who are able to intensively support people with a range of difficult and challenging issues at once.

How can I pay my council tax?

You can pay your council tax and business rates by direct debit. As well as being quicker and easier, it ensures that your payments are always on time – and it also helps us to save money too.

NEWS in brief

Up to £8 million set aside for district's leisure centres

We are setting aside up to £8 million to invest in our leisure centres as part of a new leisure management contract.

We own three leisure centres — Bourne Community Leisure Centre in Southbourne; The Grange Leisure and Community Centre in Midhurst; and Westgate Leisure Centre in Chichester. Since 1 May 2016, the day-to-day management of these facilities and our Sports Development Service has been carried out by external company Everyone Active, but the contract comes to an end in April 2026.

We have been working with specialist leisure consultants, Cabinet Members, council officers and external stakeholders to develop a procurement strategy that sets out the council's preferred approach to procuring the new leisure contract. We expect that the contract will be awarded in January 2026, following approval by Cabinet and Council.

Vital funding extension agreed for theatre and gallery

Cultural grants for Chichester Festival Theatre (CFT) and Pallant House Gallery (PHG) will continue for a further year after the current funding agreement ends next spring. Councillors agreed that Chichester Festival Theatre should receive £187,500 for the period 1 April 2025 – 31 March 2026, while Pallant House Gallery would receive £130,000 for the same period.

The decision was made in order to help CFT and PHG while the government undertakes its spending review. The huge cultural, economical, and social contribution that they make to our district was recognised by councillors, who wanted to ensure that they receive support over the next year. Our funding also enables CFT to unlock further crucial funding of over £1.7 million each year from Arts Council England.



Local residents and business tenants at The Ridgeway parade in Sherborne Road, Chichester are benefiting from major improvements that we have carried out.

The property, which we own and lease out, needed significant improvements and over the last couple of years our Building Services Team have completed a range of works.

This included work to prevent water ingress on the top of the canopy, repairing the concrete, repairing and repainting the canopy and replacing the entrance doors, updating signage and installing environmentally friendly bespoke lighting to the entire parade. The entrance doors were funded using a contribution from tenants while lighting and signage were funded with money secured from the UK Government.

The project has helped make this locally listed building and key local landmark pride of place again, and the council has received lots of positive feedback from both businesses and residents.



Tourism funding in the Chichester District to continue for the next year

Councillors have demonstrated their commitment to the area's tourism sector after agreeing that an annual grant should continue for the next year.

'The Great Sussex Way' (TGSW) market and manage the tourism offering across the whole of the district on behalf of Chichester District Council to increase footfall, dwell time and spend to our local businesses. They also liaise with, and promote, more than 700 businesses and organisations.

The £130,000 funding that has been agreed is an interim arrangement. This will provide continuity and enable TGSW to carry on their important activities for the next financial year until Visit England finalises its new destination management structure.

Tourism plays a vital role within our district's economy and supports many jobs within the area which is why this funding is so important.



Devolution

and local government reorganisation

You may have seen in the media that the government have outlined plans for both devolution and the reorganisation of local government.

Devolution and the reorganisation of local government are two different things.

Devolution involves introducing strategic authorities with an elected mayor across England, so that government can hand more powers down from Whitehall. Elected mayors will oversee areas representing two or more current county council geographical areas and will be handed more power over things such as strategic housing and planning; transport; environment; support, business and research; and public safety. A strategic authority would represent a population size of at least 1.5 million residents.

In December, the government invited upper tier (county and unitary) authorities to submit bids for devolution by 10 January for a place on their fast-track scheme. In our area, West Sussex County Council, East Sussex County Council and Brighton and Hove Council requested to create a strategic authority based on their combined footprint, which covers around 1.7 million residents.

The bid was given the green light by the government. The consultation for Sussex and Brighton devolution is open until 13 April – you can take part at: www.gov. uk/government/consultations/sussex-and-brighton-devolution/sussex-and-brighton-devolution-consultation


The aim is to agree a new strategic authority by September and if approved, this will be created in March 2026 with mayoral elections being held in May 2026.

Local government reorganisation is separate to devolution, but links with the government's overall aims. The government wants all areas to have unitary councils across the country, with each serving a minimum of 500,000 residents. For the Sussex area, this is likely to mean the creation of three new unitary councils. This would mean all of the existing councils merging into the new unitary councils. Our detailed business case has to be submitted by 26 September and we are working with all councils in Sussex to put forward a proposal that best serves our community.

As Sussex has been accepted onto the fast-track devolution route, the new authorities will have shadow elections in May 2027, and they are expected to come into effect in April 2028.

We want to assure you that regardless of these proposed changes, our services will still be provided to you, and we will make the transition as smooth as we possibly can. We will also keep you closely informed as we receive more information.

Our MOT Test Station Team have highlighted some of the most common MOT failures and tips on how to beat them below. While we do not undertake repairs or servicing, there are a number of simple checks that you can carry out before an MOT test to make sure your car is ready. These are also checks that are useful to carry out all year round.



Broken lights are one of the most common reasons for MOT failure. Are they all fully working? Get a family member or friend to sit in the car while you walk round checking every light. This should include front, rear, headlights and dipped, hazards and indicators and number plates.



Tyres

Ensure your tyres are fully inflated. You can do this by using a tyre pressure checker and measuring the results against the outlines in your car manual.



Windscreen, wipers and washers

These are one of the easiest areas to look over before your MOT. Check your windscreen for any damage or cracks. Damage in the driver's central view should be no larger than 10mm. In the whole of the swept area, it should be no larger than 40mm. If it is, make sure you get it fixed in advance of the MOT test — often this will be covered by your car insurance. Also, check that your front windscreen wipers clear the windscreen in conjunction with the washers.



Exhaust, noise and leaks

To check if the exhaust is leaking, start the engine and from the rear of the car listen for any unusual noises and look for any abnormal smoke. These indicate a leak, which should be fixed before the MOT. If you have a diesel car, with a diesel particulate filter and there's smoke of any colour coming from the exhaust, it will fail – so check it out beforehand.



Final checks

Make sure that the fuel cap is secure, and your mirrors are in good condition. Also check that the doors, horn, and seatbelts,

are all fully functional. Check that there are no warning lights on and check the brake fluid, windscreen washer and oil reserves.



'Step by Step Guide' to downloading the Chichester District Council app

1 Head to the Apple Store or Google Play Store on your smartphone device.

- 2 Type in 'Chichester District Council' into the search bar. Our free app will pop up in the results.
- Click to download it onto your mobile device. You can now exit the app store. The app should now show up amongst the icons on your home screen.
- 4 Open the app, type in your postcode and select your address from a drop-down list. You will also be prompted to enter your contact details, so you can receive important updates when reporting incidents to us.
- 5 Don't forget to click 'allow notifications' in the notifications tab to ensure you don't miss out on important reminders and announcements.

AGAINST LITTER, AGAINST FLY TIPPING

WE'RE AGAINST FLY TIPPING, ARE YOU?



Fly tipping is an offence that we take very seriously. Not only does it ruin the landscape of our beautiful district, but it also poses an environmental risk. During 2023 – 2024 we experienced 888 fly tips, with fly tipping costing us more than £350,000 to clear up every year. We are working hard to tackle this issue, but we need your help.

Your rubbish, your responsibility

One of the most important roles you can play in the fight against fly tipping is to make sure that anyone you employ to remove and dispose of your excess household waste is licensed as a waste carrier with the Environment Agency.

By law, you are responsible for any waste produced on your property. This is known as your 'duty of care', and means that whether you have finished a DIY project; been clearing out unwanted household items; or have been busy sprucing up your garden, it is down to you to make sure that your waste is disposed of safely and legally.

If you ask someone to remove your waste, it's vital that you use a licensed waste carrier and ask for a waste transfer note as evidence. If you don't do this, and your waste is fly tipped, you could be held responsible and face a fine. This could also result in a prosecution.

Use our Bulky Waste or Garden Recycling services

Donate unwanted items to charity

WHAT ARE WE DOING?

We regularly carry out stop and search type initiatives in partnership with the Environment Agency and Sussex Police. These operations involve stopping vehicles that can carry waste and checking that they meet all the legal requirements in order to disrupt potential fly tipping activities.

In addition, we also issue Fixed Penalty Notices to people who give their waste to non-registered waste carriers.

We are also working with local tradespeople to raise awareness of the importance of registering as a licensed waste carrier. As part of this, we are providing a marketing pack to those who are licensed, which includes a sticker to put in their van or premises, and a logo for their website to show that they are licensed.

However, it is important that you check the Environment Agency website for an up-to-date list of licensed waste carriers before employing anyone to dispose of your waste.

Climate change consultation

We all have an important part to play in helping to combat climate change. Last summer, we asked people for their opinions on potential projects that could help individuals and communities to reduce their carbon emissions.

1,382 people visited our online survey, almost seven times the number of the previous consultation in 2020, and over 1,000 of these completed the survey. This was one of the best responses that the council has ever seen – so thank you! This feedback is being used to help shape our new climate emergency action plan, which will be discussed by Cabinet and Full Council later this year.

Housing consultation

At the start of this year, we launched our 'Let's Talk: Housing' consultation and invited you to have your say on the aims and actions that we're considering including in our new Housing, Homelessness and Rough Sleeping Strategy 2025-2030.

Housing is one of the council's top priorities and this strategy is crucial because it sets out how we can support all our residents. This includes working with our partners to prevent people from becoming homeless; creating and retaining affordable housing for young people and families; addressing the housing needs of older people; and improving housing standards for everyone.

Over 600 people have visited our consultation and we're busy reviewing all your feedback, which we'll take this into account before presenting the final strategy to Full Council for consideration later this year.

Play areas consultation

We've also been really pleased to see the positive response to our recent play areas consultation! We spoke to the children, parents, and carers who use our play parks in Sherbourne Road; Whyke Oval; the Amphitheatre; Priory Park; Florence Park; and Oaklands Park, to find out what improvements they would like to see. Their ideas then helped to shape the final designs, which we consulted on back in February.



We're investing £800,000 to enhance these play parks and work is due to begin over the next few weeks.


